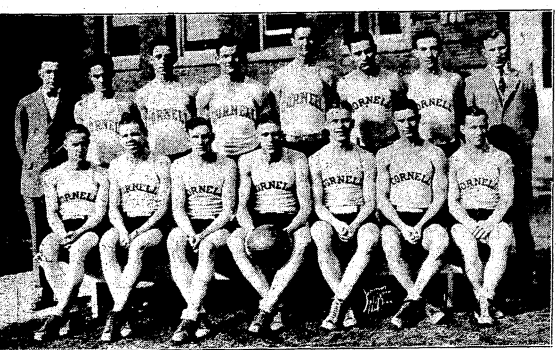
Play Newton Five Who Down Webster City 29-15, Tonight
